- Not particularly standardized
- Not pass / fail
- Extremely informative

- Seller, Agent, Seller Vet
- Length of ownership, past and current use
- Feed, supplements, living conditions
- Farrier care
- Veterinary exams, vaccinations, deworming, Coggins, X-rays, surgeries, medications
- Illness, lameness, chronic conditions
- If mare; foals, breeding, recent exposure to stallion
- Stallion or gelding (when gelded?)
- Bad habits or vices like cribbing, weaving, biting...

PHYSICAL EXAM

- Heart, lungs, skin, muscle tone, skeletal correctness, mouth, teeth, eyes, feet
- Movement exam (lunging, walking/trotting away and towards, flexion)
- Neurological
- Reproductive
- X-rays / Radiographs
- May require sedation



SUITABLE LOCATION

- Sheltered
- Flat
- Sufficiently large
- Suitable for jogging/trotting
- Relatively free of monsters and horse eating predators
- Concrete floor is very helpful for X-Rays



WHAT IF THE HORSE HAS "ISSUES" BUT I ALREADY LOVE HER?

- Will they prevent the horse from performing in your chosen discipline?
- Can you deal with additional expense / effort in order to address the issues?
- Is the horse suitable for something else that you'd enjoy?
- Is the horse better suited somewhere else?
